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Gish Gallopers: Dry Up the Firehose by <u>Steven N. Peskind</u> Reprinted from <u>The Successful Lawyer</u> blog

Recently, I listened to an interview by Guy Kawasaki on his Remarkable People podcast. He interviewed British Journalist Mehdi Hasan on his new book "Win Every Argument: The Art of Debating, Persuading, and Public Speaking."

While I consider myself an accomplished arguer, Hasan grabbed my attention with his description of one technique that is confounding. Under this form of argumentation, the arguer rapidly spouts a firehose of misinformation: half-truths, misrepresentations, and outright lies. Because of the format of the debate, the responding party can't deal with the flood of untruths and is effectively stymied.

I see it in court. Trying to respond to a tsunami of misinformation reminds me of a brief I read a few years ago where the author referred to herself as resembling a mosquito in a nudist camp. "I know what to do, I just don't know where to begin."

From my experience, most who act this way do so from ill preparedness rather than overt dishonesty. there is an opportunity for a full hearing, which sometimes takes weeks, if not months. I think of these folks as octopi with briefcases, spewing out blinding ink to scuttle away from danger.

This reminds me of another law of rhetoric, Brandolini's Law, which provides, "The amount of energy needed to refute bullshit is an order of magnitude bigger than that needed to produce it." This law is particularly pernicious in a viral internet culture. But it is also pervasive in advocacy. I've often grappled with how to respond to the false claims that come from the pens and mouths of my opponents. It's hard work and near impossible to prove a negative!

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Know What You're Dividing! by <u>Mark E. Sullivan</u> Author of the *The Military Divorce Handbook* 

We were just about finished with the hour-long Zoom interview when I heard it. It was one of those moments when your ear says to your brain, "What? Hold on – stop everything!"

The military client was telling his local lawyer and me how he expected

It was now clear – as it definitely had not been in the previous hour – that "John Doe" was not gracefully exiting the Army after 20 years of service at his own choice. Rather, he was being forced out with a disability retirement. And that made all the difference in the world.

#### **Disability Retirement**

We'd been discussing what share his wife would receive in the divorce settlement, how to write up the military pension division order (MPDO), how much of the pension would be allocated to her, when payments would start from the retired pay center, and what language and data points were required. But now, with the new

And that meant that there was a good possibility that none of the pension would be divided. When a servicemember gets a disability retirement under Chapter 61 of Title 10, U.S. Code, his retired pay is calculated in two ways. The first is retired pay based on his percentage of disability. The second method is pay calculated according to his years of service. The servicemember gets to decide which to receive. 10 U.S.C. § 1401(a). In John's case, if the higher amount were based on percentage of disability and he chose that, then none of the pension would be divisible. 10 U.S.C. § 1408(a)(4)(A)(iii). If the higher amount were based on years of service and he chose that, then only the to retire from the Army in four months. He said he'd know for sure when the PEB report came through.

"PEB... as in Physical Evaluation Board?" I asked. He confirmed that's what he meant.


As stated on their website, their Center is "a safe place for moms and dads to learn how to peacefully coparent and how to keep children from the middle of adult disputes."


Although located in Maine, a benefit of COVID, has now resulted in their establishing virtual programming for families in rural areas in Maine, as well as many other states. The program educates parents about the impact on their children of continued exposure to their high conflict relationship. One portion of the program works with "separated parents who are so entrenched in chronic conflict with one another that they have lost sight of the negative effects their behavior is having on their children."

The program also includes participation of the children so that they have a "neutral place where they can freely express their feelings." The emphasis is on coping strategies and mindfulness.


